Folds of Honor pledges to operate in a respectful manner to every partner, donor and family that it supports. The organization is proud to be considered a high-performing nonprofit that has achieved the highest-possible ratings by GuideStar and Charity Navigator.

The Charities Review Council recommends that at least 65 percent of a nonprofit's three-year average annual expenses are used to directly support programming, with an ideal range between 70 percent and 90 percent. Folds of Honor is proud to report a cumulative average ratio of 91 percent of annual expenses supporting our scholarship program.

This average can be derived from pages one and 10 of the Folds of Honor IRS Form 990. Financials were prepared by an independent accountant and reviewed by an audit committee.

In 2021, Folds of Honor awarded approximately \$30 million in educational scholarships to more than 6,000 students. Scholarships are valued at \$5,000 and are awarded to qualifying spouses and children of fallen or disabled U.S. service members. Since its inception in 2007, Folds of Honor has awarded nearly 35,000 total scholarships in all 50 states.

Presently, we have provided more than 35,000 academic scholarships totaling about \$160 million to deserving and qualified spouses and children of military members who have fallen or been disabled while serving in the United States Armed Forces. Among the students served, 41 percent are minorities. Our educational scholarships support private-school tuition or tutoring in grades K-12, as well as post-secondary tuition (two- or four-year college/university, technical or trade school).

Folds' newest Owasso headquarters will help build a stronger future for military spouses and children

OWASSO, Okla. — Folds of Honor won't move into its new headquarters until 2022, but the organization took an opportunity to celebrate a milestone in its construction.

On June 16, officials from Folds joined with project builders to host a traditional "topping-out" ceremony, marking the installation of the final beam to the building's steel structure.

The facility — three stories and about 30,000 square feet — is being constructed through the generosity of Associated Builders and Contractors of Oklahoma and their contractors, subcontractors and others who have donated their time and labor.

"We're all serving in different ways, and the noble mission that sits here behind me is nothing short of humbling," said Air Force Reserve Lt. Col. Dan Rooney, founder of the Folds of Honor, standing in front of the facility.

"I'm not going to come up with the right words to say, *Thank you*," Rooney said. "But what I can promise you on behalf of Folds of Honor is this building is going to put us in a fight that we will not stop until we take care of every family."

Folds of Honor provides educational scholarships to spouses and children of fallen and disabled military veterans. This fall, it will disperse about \$30 million in scholarship funds.

The building, expected to open in the spring, is located at The Patriot Golf Club near Folds' original headquarters in Owasso. That original facility also was built by ABC. staff members and has been forced to rent office space.

"Absolutely no scholarship funds were used to build this new home, due to some of the greatest patriots that I've ever encountered," Rooney said. John Smaligo, president and CEO of ABC, a group that represents meritshop construction and construction-related firms, thanked ABC's board of directors.

"The group of leaders that we had 12 years ago stepped forward at a time when Folds of Honor was brand new," Smaligo said. "When it came time more recently to expand and build the magnificent facility you see behind us, that group stepped forward once again and said, Absolutely. We want to take this on.

"Without them, I don't know where this project would be right now."

As part of the ceremony, the final beam was raised into place with an evergreen tree and an American flag attached. The tree symbolizes a safe and successful construction, and offers good wishes for the construction workers and all who will occupy the building. Folds of Honor offers two kinds of scholarship

Rooney said: "This fall, we'll send about 6,300 families to school. That's \$30 million out the door. But we'll also have thousands of unfunded qualified requests.

"This building is a force multiplier that's going to help us chip away at that each and every day."

Folds launches its first virtual chapter

The website, founded by Ginger Bell, who coproduced the 2020 documentary "Films for Good" and featured the Folds of Honor, launched at the EPM Broker Success Summit event in Atlanta. EPM, an Atlanta-based mortgage broker, kicked off the launch with a donation of \$40,000 to Folds of Honor.

The chapter is the first of its kind for Folds of Honor. Through the "Films for Good" documentary, Bell learned about the impactful stories of families that have been affected by having a loved one injured or killed while serving in the military. This inspired her to start a

and with Folds of Honor dedicated specifically to the housing industry. Last year, Folds of Honor was 1000 able to provide educational scholarships to more than 4,500 family members of wounded and fallen troops. However, in that same year, the foundation had to decline more than 3,000 applicants.

"Our goal is to turn the 3,000 'No's' that Folds of Honor was not able to fulfill into 'Go's' and provide additional funding and awareness to this incredible organization," Bell said. "That's why our motto is 'No2Go' and why we started the foundation, No2Go Foundation, dedicated to raising funds and awareness for the Folds of Honor educational scholarship program." EPM is the first organization to join the No2Go Foundation as a founding lender.

"I had the honor of watching the Folds of Honor documentary and am inspired by Folds' mission and commitment to the families of our heroes," EPM CEO Eddy Perez said. "EPM is a people company that values education, and I am excited for the company to participate in a program that allows individuals to continue to learn, grow and succeed. It just makes sense to give back to our veteran families, especially those who have given the ultimate sacrifice."

Nick Nichols, a retired Air Force colonel and the Folds of Honor's executive vice president of operations and relationships, said: "We are beyond excited to partner with No2Go and are so thankful for their incredible life-changing support. Together we can ensure that no military family is left behind on the field of battle. The gift of education provides generational change and is a lasting bridge to equality, especially for the 41 percent of our recipients who are diverse. We salute you!"

Newest chapter addition: Welcome, South Dakota!

The Folds of Honor has added its first chapter in South Dakota.

The South Dakota chapter, based in Sioux Falls, has been gaining recognition and donations. Locally, it has garnered support from surrounding organizations, such as the Hy-Vee/Sanford Legends for Kids, which has donated \$60,000.

"The South Dakota chapter officially launched in September, and it's an honor for us to have the Hy-Vee/ Sanford Legends event as one of our largest fundraisers," said Brad Coleman, South Dakota's chapter president and a member of the Folds of Honor's board of directors.

Coleman hopes that the Folds of Honor's South Dakota chapter will continue to grow and be recognized.

"South Dakota can look to our Minnesota neighbor, as the state has a great Folds of Honor chapter," he said. "Minnesota has raised over \$2 million since its inception. The South Dakota chapter has goals to do the same. During the last five years, five scholarships have gone to families of fallen South Dakota servicemen. Recipients receive up to \$5,000 a year based on need.



NCAA honors Rooney with Silver Anniversary Award

Lt. Col. Dan Rooney, the founder of Folds of Honor and a former college golfer at the University of Kansas, received the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award earlier this year.

The award annually recognizes distinguished individuals on the 25th anniversary of the conclusion of their collegiate careers. The honorees were selected by the NCAA Honors Committee, composed of representatives of NCAA member schools, conferences and distinguished citizens, including past awardees. Rooney was one of seven award recipients this year.

"We are so proud of former Kansas studentathlete Lieutenant Colonel Dan Rooney for being honored with the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award," said Jeff Long, former athletic director at Kansas. "Through Folds of Honor, he has changed the lives of so many servicemen and -women who have endured tragic circumstances. Lieutenant Colonel Rooney's philanthropy and service is a shining example of how former student-athletes can and do make our world a better place. Congratulations, Lieutenant Colonel Rooney. You inspire us all."

Rooney was recognized during a virtual awards show on Jan. 13.

The other 2021 recipients were Shareef Abdur-Rahim (California); Adam J. Burgasser (University of California, San Diego); Michelle M. Marciniak (Tennessee); Fernando Palomo (Texas A&M); Amy E. Reinhard (Harvard); and Michelle Cusimano Vachris (Virginia).

Rooney, a letter winner at Kansas in 1995 and 1996, had an accomplished on-course career. He won the 1995 Kansas Invitational and took sixth place at the 1996 NCAA Central Regional. He helped the Jayhawks finish second at the Big Eight Championships in 1995 and finish fifth at the 1996 NCAA Division I Men's Golf Championships.

He played professionally briefly after college, while also enrolling in flight school. He eventually served his country on three combat tours to Iraq. During his time serving, Rooney founded Folds of Honor.

By this fall, Folds of Honor will have provided nearly 35,000 scholarships totaling \$160 million to families. Rooney's organization handed out its first Folds of Honor scholarship in 2007. He serves as the founder and chief executive officer.

For his efforts starting such an impactful organization, Rooney has won the PGA of America's Patriot Award, and he also was named a "Person of the Year" in 2008 by "ABC World News Tonight." Rooney was awarded Fox Nation's Ultimate Patriot Award in 2019.

Rooney is a two-time recipient of the Top Gun award and a recipient of the Spirit of Attack Award as a top graduate of F-16 training. The White House presented Rooney with the President's Volunteer Service Award. The Air National Guard awarded him its Distinguished Service Medal and Directors Service Award.

The Air Force bestowed Rooney with the Air Force Commendation Medal, Air Medal, Anti-Terrorism Medal, Combat Readiness Medal and Air Expeditionary Medal. He also received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.

"I'm thankful for the incredible impact the University of Kansas and the KU golf team has had on my life," Rooney told *Tulsa World*. "I am very blessed to be able to pay forward the gift of an education."

University of Memphis accepts Folds of Honor scholarship as payment in full for higher-education tuition

The University of Memphis will accept the Folds of Honor scholarship, a \$5,000 annual award, as payment in full for tuition, the Tennessee school announced. The Folds of Honor scholarship supports higher education for spouses and children of America's fallen and disabled service members. Memphis is the first university to partner with Folds of Honor.

The announcement reaffirms the UofM's commitment to educational scholarships for the families of military members who have been killed or severely disabled in action.

"Freedom is not free," said Lt. Col. Dan Rooney, the founder of Folds of Honor. Rooney was inspired to act on behalf of military families when, after his second tour of duty, he was on a commercial flight to Grand Rapids, Mich., carrying the remains of Army Cpl. Brock Bucklin, who was killed in Iraq. Brock's twin brother, Brad, was on that flight, bringing his brother home one final time. Looking out his window, Rooney saw Bucklin's family, which included Bucklin's 4-year-old son, Jacob, waiting outside on the tarmac.

"I witnessed the other side of war that day," Rooney said. "In the U.S., there are 1.5 million dependents of service members who have been killed or disabled. Nine out of 10 of those don't get educational assistance. We want to make sure we don't leave their families behind on the field of honor."

M. David Rudd, the University of Memphis' president, said of the initiative: "I couldn't be prouder of our community. My hope is that universities across the country will step forward and do the very same thing."

Twenty-seven Memphis

students have benefited from the Folds of Honor Scholarship, and six more recently were awarded the scholarship. By this fall, the Folds of Honor Foundation will have awarded nearly 35,000 scholarships representing \$160 million in educational benefits.

To make these educational opportunities possible, the university needs the help of donors to cover the \$5,000 cost difference between the scholarship award and tuition. Each gift can go a long way toward helping students whose families have made tremendous sacrifices for our country to pursue their dreams of obtaining a college degree.

he shingle on the clubhouse that sits not far off the sandy shores of Lake Michigan now reads American Dunes, and Lt. Col. Dan Rooney has many fond memories here. His father, John Rooney, a former geography professor at Oklahoma State University, purchased the course that sits in this summer retreat in 1998, when it was known as Grand Haven Golf Club.

The family jokingly called the old clubhouse "The Laundromat." The course was tree-lined and tight. Bumper pool, some called it, but the original W. Bruce Matthews layout was good enough to crack Golf Digest's esteemed list of top-100 courses in the 1990s. As of just a few years ago, though, Grand Haven was weary, its race run, like so many good venues of our past. The easiest and most lucrative exit plan was to carve up the land and sell it to a developer. Dan Rooney had one last Hail Mary of an idea. As founder and CEO of the Folds of Honor. he produces many. He wished to preserve what was the birthplace of his beloved Folds, and infuse it with higher purpose.

On the brink of desperation, Rooney scheduled an early 2018 meeting with Jack Nicklaus yes, *that* Jack Nicklaus — at The Bear's Club in Jupiter, Fla. The two had developed a relationship through the Folds, and Rooney, low on options, summoned the courage to ask his boyhood hero a transcendent question: *Sir, could* you help me out here?

"I knew I wasn't going to say no," Nicklaus said. "He was going to give me a big three-hour schpiel, and I said, 'You don't need to do that. We just need to know what you want to do, and we'll go do it.' I was very honored that he asked me to be part of it."

So, Nicklaus, nearing 80 at the time (he turns 82 in January), waived his \$3 million design fee and got to work. He and his crew took out more than 1,000 trees, leaving only those on the property's perimeter, and unearthed the rugged dunesland that was waiting to be discovered. "When we got here," Nicklaus said, as if relaying a secret, "we were blown away by how good a piece of property it was."

American Dunes is its new name, and the golf course and surrounds were built with heartfelt meaning. Every penny of profit will benefit Folds of Honor families that have lost loved ones or had loved ones severely injured while in service to their country. It was at Grand Haven in 2007 that the very first Folds fundraiser was held, raising about \$8,700, the sum donated to offset the future college costs of young Jacob Bucklin (now Green), whose father, Army Cpl. Brock Bucklin, had been killed in Iraq.

Rooney, a PGA professional and Air Force F-16 fighter pilot who already had flown two tours in Iraq, was on the commercial flight to Grand Haven in May 2006 that brought Bucklin's body home to Michigan one last time. He cried as he saw young Jacob, then 4, standing on a rainy tarmac with his family, waiting for the casket to be lowered from the cargo hold. Rooney had not seen this side of war. He knew this little boy would never fish with his dad, or throw a baseball with him. Passengers on the flight had been asked to stay seated while the casket was lowered; roughly half the passengers, with no connections to make, stood up and walked out. Angered, and saddened, Rooney vowed to do something – anything - to remove some of the Bucklins' great pain.

Some 15 years later, the Folds of Honor — named for the 13 folds that get a flag to its triangular shape has reached 35,000 scholarships. Roughly 6,350 more scholarships will be awarded this fall, pushing the mission's fundraising total past \$160 million.

American Dunes offers a dramatic setting which any golfer would savor, but it represents much more than a round of golf. It is a complete patriotic experience. Golfers are asked to show up an hour before their tee times and do not reach the front door to the pro shop without walking through an elaborate walkway through 8-foot walls where the story of the Folds is told. There are plaques that honor military members and families who paid the ultimate sacrifice for our freedoms. One walks through the bronzeplated boot imprints of the fallen. It is an emotional, goosebump-filled experience, the start to a fulfilling day's journey.

The course itself, which opened in May, has received excellent reviews. It's fun, and very playable, and still plenty challenging, especially from 7,213 yards when those chilly winds off Lake Michigan to the west roll in. Both nines ease a player in before the fireworks start to crackle. On the first nine, the walk to the par-3 fourth tee opens up a sprawling vista showing off pretty much the rest of the golf course. Equally stirring is the heartpumping rush one gets after cresting the hill following a blind tee shot at the par-4 11th. Rooney likes to call that one of the course's "moments."

"It's a spiritual, emotional moment where you see six different holes from that point, all traversing through the dunes," Rooney said. "I think there are moments out here that take your breath away. The place plays with such an awesome cadence, from long to short, big greens to small greens. It's so memorable."

The compelling finishing holes at American Dunes capture the variety

that lies in the challenge. The par-4 16th hole - 502 yards from the Jet tees, and 449 from the Valor tees - is rated the toughest hole on the course, a longish brute with sandy dunes lining its right side. The 17th hole (384 yards from the Valor tees) has the flexibility to transition into an exciting, drivable par 4, this one protected by dunes along the left, and played to a challenging green complex. The 18th hole has a little bit of rewind to the old Grand Haven days, a tight par 5 with a risk/reward approach to a green guarded by water along the right. Across the pond, between the ninth and 10th fairways nearby, a massive flagpole stands watch, as Old Glory flies majestically each day, and is lowered each evening 30 minutes after sunset.

"I want people here to play, have fun, [and] say, I had a great day, but I also contributed to a great cause," Nicklaus said. "That's sort of what this golf course is. I think it's going to serve its purpose."



American Dunes has so many distinct touches and features beyond its educational and emotional entrance. Each hole features a plaque depicting one of Nicklaus' record 18 major victories along with a second plaque telling the story of a fallen hero whose family has been assisted through a Folds scholarship. Each day at 1300 hours (1 p.m.), a bell tolls 13 times, with everyone and everything stopping on the course to reflect on the freedoms we enjoy each day. Timewise, the 2½-minute window seems to be 10 times that. It's quite powerful.

Fighter pilots love speed, right? Each red, white or blue golf cart has padded custom seats, sporty mag wheels and built-in JBL speakers. Inside the clubhouse, in the militarythemed CAVU Squadron Bar — CAVU is a pilot's term representing Ceiling and Visibility Unlimited, or a clear blue-sky day — ice-cold Budweiser flows through the shell of an actual A9 ballistic missile. Affixed over the bar area are two replica F-4 Phantom IIs that represent Pardo's Push, an historic aviation maneuver from the Vietnam War. A visitor to American Dunes will not need reminding where he or she is, and of the grander purpose behind it all.

The Camp, a two-story, 16-room overnight facility complete with its own basement Bunker Bar, pool tables and giant-screen televisions, will open in 2022. There is plenty of quality golf to be played across the western coast of Michigan, but nothing will match the thought-provoking experience that American Dunes offers.

"We hope when you leave here, you're compelled to make a donation with your time or your talents to be a [Folds] Squadron member, and that you take this mission forward," Rooney said. "We have not completed our mission if they leave here and they don't know really why they came.

"This will take its place as a truly unique golf experience, where you shed a tear, have a lot of laughs ... but understand that less than 1 percent of this country has the uniform on today, and if called upon, they're willing to give their lives for the freedoms you just enjoyed out here playing a round of golf at American Dunes."

Dan Rooney and his parents

look around at the re-energized, repurposed American Dunes, and there are moments when they cannot believe the jolting makeover. The journey to this point never was easy, and often challenging financially. A mission, Rooney might say, flown into the wind. Many patriots made significant contributions to bring American Dunes to life. For Rooney, making this story all the more dream-like is that his boyhood hero, Jack Nicklaus, rode in to help make Rooney's ambitious vision a reality.

"I have learned this lesson: Everything has to kind of fall apart for Him to rebuild it. That can be emotionally exhausting," said Rooney, who unapologetically lists his priorities as God, country, family and golf. "It's a human story that we see written over and over. From the darkest of places come the brightest of lights."

Rooney's plan is that American Dunes can increase exposure for the Folds, and can help educate spouses and children of our military's fallen for generations. That is a tall ray of light that is shining ever so brightly.

Patriot Golf Days shifts to Memorial Day as Folds of Honor expands its quest to lift survivors of fallen military service members By Jeff Babineau

n a gray Memorial Day on the outskirts of Tulsa, on a morning when so many others are making festive cookout plans, Lt. Col. Dan Rooney is doing what he does every day. He is concerned for his families and their futures, and doing his best to make sure that no family in need is left behind.

The annual Patriot Cup at The Patriot Golf Club has become a galvanizing tradition of goodwill that attracts support from around the country, including 15 or so PGA Champions Tour professionals who have stayed in Tulsa after a long week at the KitchenAid Senior PGA Championship. This time, the Patriot Cup is part of something bigger. Patriot Golf Days, a grassroots fundraiser for the Folds of Honor for 15 years, has made the date shift from

Labor Day to Memorial Day weekend. PGA REACH, the 501(c)3 charitable foundation of the PGA of America, is partnered alongside the Folds on its new Patriot Golf Days date in May. On this morning at the The Patriot Golf Club, there is a mix of emotions. It is a celebration for our freedoms balanced against the day's meaningful, more somber moments. Alex McIntosh reads off a roll call of the fallen, and his voice breaks as he reads the name of his son, Army Cpl. Scott A. McIntosh, who was killed in 2008 while serving during Operation Iraqi Freedom. Cpl. McIntosh was 26 years old.

Players are asked to head to their respective holes carrying with them two small American flags to plant on their opening tee. One bears the name of a fallen military member; one bears the name of a Folds of Honor recipient.

"When we are done today," Rooney tells the golfers gathered around him near the club's practice tee, "there will be over 600 flags on this golf course, making The Patriot Golf Club, for today, a memorial, and one of the

biggest memorials anywhere in this country. We ask that you plant that flag, say a prayer of thanks for your freedom, and give a prayer to that person who has given their life so that we can pursue our dreams."

The efforts of Patriot Golf Day - which now has expanded to the plural, Patriot Golf Days - have produced nearly 10,000 scholarships for spouses and children of fallen or wounded military men and women who paid great sacrifices while defending their country. Rooney likes to refer to them as "the 1 percent who keep the other 99 percent of us sleeping beneath a blanket of freedom each night." His initial ask on that first Patriot Golf Day in 2007 was simple: Rooney asked every golfer playing on Labor Day in 2007 to add a dollar to his or her green fee.

The result has been thousands of scholarships funded to lend a small

hand to Folds of Honor families, money earmarked with gratitude for up to \$5,000 a year. It helps to undo a very small fraction of the enduring pain that recipient families live through. The PGA, without which PGD never would have flown in 2007, has doubled down on growing fundraising efforts for Folds and for PGA HOPE, two groups serving the needs of veterans and their families through golf.

"Dan and I got together at the PGA Show [in 2019] and said, 'OK, how do we reimagine this?" said Seth Waugh, CEO of the PGA of America. "We've played since then, and talked and texted a bunch. We said, 'How could 1 +1 = 3?' That's essentially what we wanted to do. If we go 50/50 in this thing, how do we turn something that's a really good thing into a really great thing? And that's what it's about."

Folds was established by Rooney to help spouses and children of fallen military members attend school and get their education, something many might not have the means to do without some assistance. The Folds mantra: Honor their sacrifice by educating their legacy. PGA HOPE introduces golf to veterans with disabilities to enhance their physical, mental, social and emotional well-being. The program includes a developmental six-to-eightweek curriculum taught by PGA

professionals trained in adaptive golf and military cultural competency. The HOPE program already has impacted thousands of veterans.

"By partnering with the Folds of Honor on Patriot Golf Days over Memorial Day weekend, we are expanding our outreach to the families of those we serve through golf," said PGA of America President Jim Richerson. "This is a natural extension of our long-standing mission to support our nation's heroes."

The PGA's Waugh says there are many things his organization does that leave him with a good feeling in his heart. PGA HOPE, he says, is the program that leads him to tears. He recalls a day at Congressional, outside our nation's capital, when the PGA chose a number of veterans who had been through PGA HOPE and anointed them as ambassadors over three days of training.

"You get filled up just being around these people," Waugh said. "They are so grateful, so thoughtful, so willing to serve. It's really cool. ... I feel good about a lot of things we do. HOPE is the one that makes me cry. It makes me smile, and makes me cry. In joy."

It is an emotional experience when the Folds is able to make its calls to recipient families on the magical day that scholarship awards are disbursed.

That call, for all families, can be lifechanging. This autumn, the Folds will send nearly 6,350 spouses and children to school, at a cost of \$30 million. The generosity from donors, and from Folds' corporate sponsors, and the numbers produced are



nothing short of astounding, given the Folds' modest roots and start 15 years ago, when Rooney operated from a room above his garage in Broken Arrow, Okla. Today, two terrific golf courses — The Patriot and American Dunes, in Grand Haven, Mich. — help the cause, and ground has been broken in Owasso on a beautiful new headquarters built chiefly through donations. Still, Rooney and the Folds continue to press on, knowing the organization has work to do in getting to where it wants to be.

"On the other side of those [recipient] letters are the letters that we send out to families — thousands of families, who are qualified to receive Folds of Honor scholarships — but we don't have the funds," Rooney said.

He pauses and looks out to the golfers who have gathered in Tulsa on this gray Memorial Day, his squadron on this quest. "That's why we need you in the fight ... to assure that we do not leave any family behind on the field of battle."

THE MCINTOSH: ONE GOLD STAR FATHER'S TRIBUTE TO HONOR THE MEMORY OF HIS SON

he Scott A. McIntosh Memorial Golf Tournament is the longest-running and largest-yielding grassroots Folds of Honor/Patriot Golf Days tournament in the country. Hosted by Gold Star father Alex McIntosh, this event, first played in 2009, has raised more than \$5 million, funding more than 1,000 educational scholarships for Folds of Honor.

The event honors the memory of U.S. Army Cpl. Scott A. McIntosh, who was killed in action along with four other enlisted men on March 10, 2008, while serving in Operation Iraqi Freedom. McIntosh was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 64th Armor Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division out of Fort Stewart, Ga. He died of injuries sustained in Baghdad when a suicide bomber detonated an explosive device. McIntosh was 26 years old.

"He was a good kid, had a great heart," Alex McIntosh said of his son in a story that ran on ESPN.com in 2016. "Everybody liked Scott. He was one of those people everyone gravitated toward. Nothing ever got him down."

The McIntosh is a two-day event hosted annually in Scott McIntosh's hometown of Houston, at famed Champions Golf Club. In addition to golf, the event features a Patriots Gala dinner and a keynote speaker, oftentimes a Medal of Honor recipient or other high-ranking member of the armed forces.

The McIntosh also features a 21-ball salute and a traditional four-player scramble, live and silent auctions, visits from scholarship recipients and their families, and a Folds of Honor guest speaker. There is an annual roll call of fallen service members that takes place before the sounding of taps, and flags are placed by friends and family in remembrance next to a memorial that includes troops' boots and dog tags. Each small flag planted includes a yellow ribbon attached with the name of a fallen service member.

"I don't want people to come to the tournament and just play golf and eat a meal and drink beer," McIntosh said. "When they come to this event, from the moment they walk on property, they are bombarded with emotion and patriotism. I want them to have an emotional connection to the whole experience. The tears flow at our event."

There is a dedicated group of proud donors and sponsors who honor the memory of Cpl. McIntosh at this event each year; attendees actually are honoring all men and women in uniform with their presence at Champions. Honor the sacrifice of those who serve, some of whom have paid the ultimate price, by educating their legacy.

The McIntosh stands as the largest annual event for the Folds of Honor's South Texas chapter, helping to propel South Texas to becoming the Folds' second-largest chapter in the country.

"Alex, Gwenna (Scott's mother) and Eric McIntosh (Scott's brother) have turned their tragedy into triumph by honoring their fallen hero through this charitable event," said Diane Nemecek, regional development officer for the Folds' South Texas chapter. "Their dedication to selflessly serving others while paying tribute to their late son is nothing short of remarkable."

golf event that raises a great amount of money to fund Folds of Honor scholarships each year, Alex McIntosh also gives of his time as a member of the Folds' South Texas chapter's board of directors.

"He is always helping our chapter find new ways to improve and grow," Nemecek said, "and we are so thankful to him for the many ways he and the family give back to others."

Initially, Alex McIntosh feared that others might forget about his son, and would not remember the incredible sacrifice that this family made so that others could live in freedom.

"Everybody knows who he is," Alex said of Scott, "because he's still making a difference, still out there helping the cause. That's what makes this all worth it."





GOBEFORE YOU'RE READY

ROWING UP, I WATCHED MY VHS TAPE OF TOP GUN SO MANY TIMES THAT SEVERAL SCENES IN THE

MOVIE WERE WORN DOWN AND ALMOST UNVIEWABLE. And since there weren't any fighter jets at the local Stillwater (Okla.) municipal airport, that warped tape served as my primary motivation. Thirteen years and probably a thousand viewings later, I would find myself breathing the beautiful smell of JP-8 jet fuel on one of the best days of my life. My dream of flying solo in the F-16 was finally about to come true. The Undergraduate Pilot Training program had been the most intense challenge of my life up to that point. With Sheppard Air Force Base in our rearview mirror, I soon arrived at Luke, and endured a month of academics and simulators. The next step was getting airborne, in which I had to successfully complete four rides with instructors in the F-16D model, a two-seat variant.

After my fourth flight, my IP, call sign "Rock," smiled big and halfjokingly said, "Don't kill yourself" as he signed my grade sheet. He cleared me to go solo in sequence with the syllabus at the F-16 schoolhouse. Getting cleared solo was required to prevent ending up as just another washout. When I stepped out of the crew van at Luke Air Force Base, a.k.a. Fighter Country USA, I couldn't believe this moment had arrived. I approached the jet with more excitement than nervousness. I was confident in my ability, but to be completely honest, I didn't know if I was ready. It didn't matter, because I was going whether I was ready or not. I strapped into the jet and taxied out to the runway. Once cleared for takeoff, I blasted into the CAVU sky and safely flew the F-16 for an hour, even bringing it back for a nice landing. As I climbed down the ladder from my first solo ride, I was changed forever. I didn't fully grasp it in that moment, but I had been given a life-altering gift.

THE FINAL LOE: GO BEFORE YOU ARE READY

Go before you are ready is the most powerful LOE, and incorporating this ethos will change you in unimaginable ways. I purposely placed this as the last evolution because it is the trigger to launch you into a life of CAVU. If you want to go big, you must go before you are ready. The great people and moments described in this chapter are connected by their virtues of defiance, and each offers a powerful example of what can happen when you go before you are ready. The stories herein share demonstrations of greatness, strength, and the courage required to jump with both feet and burn the boats because, well, there ain't no going back!

FIND YOUR INNER MAVERICK The first time I sat alone in the F-16, I wasn't completely sure I was up to the task of flying solo. But there I was, strapped in a \$30 million jet that had a capability of flying Mach 2.1. Having flown just those four times before and with an instructor, everything I had studied and practiced in preparation for this moment didn't feel like enough. I took a breath, said a quick prayer, reached over with my left hand, and moved the JFS* to start 2. That's right, no keys required to start the F-16 - just a lot of faith. I understood at that moment that I had to push aside fear and focus on faith. I knew that my instructors believed in me enough to clear me to go solo and that I had been working toward this moment in one way or another my entire life. I sat at the end of the runway for just a few extra seconds, soaking in the moment. Then, I moved the throttle over the detent to full

afterburner. There is no really good way to describe what it is like to fly a fighter jet. Imagine playing football, a musical instrument, and Call of Duty all at the same time, while solving a sudoku puzzle and traveling at supersonic speeds. This crazy concoction comes together and forms a purely euphoric state. Top Gun, Hollywood's best depiction of the fighter pilot's office, isn't even close to the real thing, but in some bizarre way Tom Cruise and I were kindred spirits that day I flew over the Arizona desert. You see, Maverick may be a fictitious movie character, but I can attest to the fact that Tom Cruise is a real-life maverick. Growing up, Tom was a nomad, as his parents were constantly on the move (he attended fifteen different schools by the age of fourteen). Always a spiritual person, Cruise initially wanted to become a priest before discovering acting. His gobefore-you're-ready moment occurred at eighteen when he dropped out of school and headed to New York City. Five years later, he was starring in the movie that changed my life.

SHOOT THE MOON

Great successes often occur before people feel they are truly ready for them. In 1970, a high school dropout in England named Richard Branson started a magazine with one of his buddies, called Student. This independent venture went so well that he soon managed to open a brick-andmortar record shop with the profits. Fast forward just a couple of years and he pushed his success even further with the creation of his own record label and recording studio that he rented

out to musicians in the area. The first album the company released went on to sell five million copies-not bad for a kid with no higher education, money, or experience. With a little spending cash in his pocket, Branson, now in his twenties, headed on vacation to the Virgin Islands. He was excited to meet up with a girl, but the flight he was taking was canceled due to mechanical problems (my priest calls this an "O Felix Culpa"—a "happy fault moment of intervention"). While Branson's previous ventures had been successful, at this time no one had ever heard of him and he wasn't making loads of money - yet. This did not stop him from taking a big step that he wasn't ready for. Branson chartered a private jet even though he technically didn't have the money to pay for it. He made a sign that simply said, "Virgin Air, all seats \$29.00," and quickly filled up his new rental, made back all of his money, and got to his destination (with a lot of other happy passengers from the canceled flight). Branson would go on to found Virgin Airlines and become

a billionaire several times over. His quest continues to shoot the moon, literally, as the driving force behind Virgin Galactic, which is working with NASA to make civilian spaceflight possible in the very near future. Both Branson and NASA have a long history of "go before you're ready." The world knows the story of Apollo 11 and Neil Armstrong setting foot on the moon, but NASA's defining go-before-you'reready moment actually occurred with the launch of Apollo 8, which was scheduled to be the first crewed flight of the Saturn V rocket. However, there was a big problem - Saturn V wasn't even close to ready. One test of the rocket had gone well, but the most recent test had gone terribly wrong. While NASA worked around the clock to prepare for the launch, they were faced with extreme scrutiny after the recent deaths of Gus Grissom, Ed White, and Roger Chaffee (a faulty wire had caused the pure oxygen in the command model to catch fire, killing all three astronauts). Amid congressional hearings and a public outcry to cancel

the space program, George Low, manager of the Apollo program, never flinched. In fact, he made a momentous decision. With Christmas approaching, he reached out to the three astronauts and told them to cancel their holiday plans; they'd be headed to the moon on Apollo 8 to attempt the first lunar orbit. Low compartmentalized the distractions and stayed focused on the task at hand. The lives of the Apollo 8 astronauts and the entire future of NASA depended on whether the Saturn V issues had been fixed. The stakes couldn't have been any higher, and the decision to launch was made for December 23, 1968. Thanks to some exceptional problem solving by NASA engineers, and by God's grace, the Saturn V worked. Apollo 8 shot the moon and completed the first lunar orbit, which paved the way for Apollo 11, the first successful moon landing. En route to the moon on Christmas Eve, the astronauts broadcast live to the world's largest television audience in history and recited chapters 1-10 from the book of Genesis.

We are now approaching lunar sunrise, and for all the people back on Earth, the crew of Apollo 8 has a message that we would like to send to you. In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. And the earth was without form, and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters. And God said, Let there be light: and there was light. And God saw the light, that it was good: and God divided the light from the darkness.

And God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And the evening and the morning were the first day. And God said, Let there be a firmament in the midst of the waters, and let it divide the waters from the waters. And God made the firmament, and divided the waters which were under the firmament from the waters which were above the firmament: and it was so. And God called the firmament Heaven. And the evening and the morning were the second day.

And God said, Let the waters under the heaven be gathered together unto one place, and let the dry land appear: and it was so. And God called the dry land Earth; and the gathering together of the waters called the Seas: and God saw that it was good. And from the crew of Apollo 8, we close with good night, good luck, a Merry Christmas and God bless all of you, all of you on the good Earth.

PARALYSIS BY ANALYSIS

While it certainly seems reasonable to get most of your ducks in a row before attempting something big (or dangerous, like flying a jet at the speed of sound), most people tend to overanalyze their given situations. Ready aim . . . aim . . . aim . . . aim. Our unreasonable perception of what "ready" really is prevents us from actually firing. There's a big difference between being mentally and physically prepared and having it all perfectly analyzed. Perfectionism can be the poison that infects our lives, dreams, and goals, and it can act like a weight that prevents us from taking any action at all. Break free from these insidious

and debilitating mental roadblocks: Vulnerability: It can be frightening to think you might be judged by peers, lose control, or even fail. But if you play it safe, you can neither lose nor win. Exclusion: You might fear that if you don't perform perfectly, you won't belong and won't be accepted by a group. You'll be left out. Shame: Any flaws or mistakes will result in a feeling of great shame. This might be selfshame, or the shame of your family or colleagues. Confusing perfection and excellence: Hard work, dedication, talent, and practice should result in excellence - not necessarily perfection. Don't confuse the two.

HERE AND GONE

When Folds of Honor was young and I was working to get corporate sponsors, I thought about how great it would be to have Budweiser on board. After all, it was the beer that Maverick drank in Top Gun. At the time, I was still working out of a tiny room above my garage in Oklahoma and didn't have an office or a staff. Most glaringly, I was aware that my little operation might not seem very impressive to the folks at a major corporation like Anheuser-Busch. But my faith exceeded my fear. I told myself, so what if I was working in my garage? Our mission was strong, and I knew that we would ultimately be able to help thousands of military families. If I wanted Folds to thrive, I had to find the courage to face the verv real possibility of rejection. I jumped on a Southwest flight from Tulsa to St. Louis and drove my rental car to the brewery. I was not prepared for what I witnessed: Suffice it to say that August Busch built a cathedral to beer. My visit that day was a great field trip, but it was clear that the King of Beers was not going to saddle up with Folds of Honor in any significant way. Obviously, that wasn't the result I had hoped for, but I know our lives are defined every day by what we do when life doesn't go our way. My passion outweighed any negative feelings I had about being rejected, and I still harbored the belief and conviction that Budweiser was a perfect match for Folds ... even if we weren't big enough for them, yet. As Folds continued to grow, I kept making the pilgrimage to the brewery. I flew up every six months for the next three years, but still had little success. Then a tragic moment of synchronicity brought me back to St. Louis: A young soldier who was killed in Iraq also happened to be the son of the president's executive administrator, Sue Marler. This occurrence, terrible as it was, eventually led to a meeting with the company's president, Dave Peacock. I was set to fly up the morning of September 8, but a family emergency forced me to miss the only flight from Tulsa. I called Dave's office to reschedule, but he was booked for weeks. I knew this was a defining moment, one I'd probably not see again, so I used my personal credit card to charter a plane. With an empty private jet, and the gravity of the situation weighing on me, I called my dad to ride along for the meeting. We flew up and shared the Folds of Honor story. When we finished the meeting, I will never forget what Dave said: "I make it a best practice not to get in the way of God's will; we will figure out a way to help Folds of Honor." True to his word, Budweiser stepped up and has since donated over \$17 million in the last eight years. They are indeed "The Great American Lager," and their donation has fueled the educational dreams of more than 3,400 hundred deserving military families. The bottom line is that we are all here and gone in a short period of time. When you feel called, don't ignore it. Dreams will die if they are not nurtured. It is incredibly easy to wait for a magical moment of readiness to come before any action is taken. People often use excuses to justify their fear - "I'll approach that client when my company is more established," or "Next year I am going to move away from these brutal winters and restart my life in a coastal town."

GODSPEED

I finish all my emails and letters with the closing "Godspeed." By definition, it is a blessing for a prosperous journey. NASA bid John Glenn Godspeed before he piloted Friendship 7 and became the first man to orbit the earth. I love the term because it combines purpose (God) with motion (speed). I strive to always live my life with both. Your idea is meaningless if your fears keep you from putting it into motion. My golf coach at Kansas, Ross Randall, gave me some incredible advice: "Try your ass off, but don't give a damn what happens."
